To help low-income Ohioans access the justice system, I write simple, actionable advice about complicated legal processes. Since I'm not a lawyer, I do extensive research and collaborate with experts to craft clear, accurate articles.

Here's a quick example, written at a 6<sup>th</sup> grade reading level:

#### 1. Identify theft

If your identity is stolen, you should take these steps:

- Tell the police. Call or visit the local police department to file a report.
- **Contact each of the three credit bureaus.** Ask the bureaus (Equifax, Experian and TransUnion) for a credit freeze.
- Call the Federal Trade Commission. Call (877) ID-THEFT to file a complaint.
- Get an identification card. Ask for an identification card from the Identity Theft Verification PASSPORT Program. This card proves that you are a victim of identity theft.

## **Academic Research**

I earned a master's degree in social psychology with a focus on emotions and attitudes. Here's a short (by academic-writing standards) sample, from the introduction of a research report:

### The Effect of Cross Categorization on Emotions and Prejudice

Much research has examined issues of intergroup interaction and conflict. Many of these investigations have been interpreted within the framework of Social Identity Theory (SIT, e.g., Tajfel & Turner, 1986), a theory developed to explain the relationship between the group and the self (Hogg, 2006). According to SIT, groups are psychologically construed collections of individuals who share a common social identity, defined as the categorization of the self and others based on perceived similarities to the ingroup and differences from the outgroup (Turner, 1999). Individuals are motivated to maintain a positive social identity, and thus the presence of another group triggers comparisons favoring the ingroup (Turner, 1999).

Tajfel, Billing, Bundy, and Flament (1971) have demonstrated that being categorized, even on a trivial basis, can produce this ingroup bias. Such categorization frequently triggers prejudice and discrimination against outgroups. However, according to the most recent findings from a contact hypothesis perspective (Pettigrew & Tropp, 2006), such biases decrease when cross-category friendships form and individuals experience the warm emotions associated with such relationships. Another successful approach to decreasing prejudice is changing the salient dimension of categorization (e.g., by emphasizing a superordinate categorization like nationality or a cross-cutting shared membership like gender). For instance, González and Brown (2006) found that differentially categorized individuals express varying prejudice toward the same target, but no mechanism underlying this effect has been established. Research examining multiple category dimensions has found an additive pattern of prejudice whereby participants demonstrate the most prejudice toward individuals with whom they do not share any memberships, moderate prejudice toward individuals with whom they share one group membership but not another, and the least prejudice toward individuals with whom they share multiple group memberships (e.g., Crisp, Walsh, & Hewstone, 2006). Given that research shows that specific emotions have more influence on prejudice than do cognitions (Dovidio, Esses, Beach, & Gaertner, 2002), I combined these theoretical approaches in an attempt to demonstrate that emotions mediate the relationship between categorization and prejudice. Our work is guided by intergroup emotions theory (IET, Mackie, Devos, & Smith, 2000), which suggests that emotion can be an intergroup phenomenon: Intergroup emotions (IEs) are motivating, acute or chronic, positively or negatively valenced, socially shared reactions to events and entities made psychologically consequential by the activation and acceptance of a social identity. These emotions produce intergroup action tendencies, or the proclivity toward, intention of, or inclination for action (Mackie, Maitner, & Smith, 2007).
